AMERICAN CULTURE

q "What are the ties that hold us together? What is that 'American' identity?

"It is singularly Anglo-American. Not usually of blood anymore, but of culture. But what can such an identity mean to a Pole or a Jew or an Irishman or an African-American?

"Everything. It is the identifying central core that gave us *all* freedom from political and religious dogmatism. It is the idea that makes America distinguishable and different form all other nations. The Ango-American culture has specific guidelines and expectations, which after only a few years most newcomers begin to recognize and admire.

"That culture has a defining ethos that describes and enables us. It has a central history going back to the 1600s (when almost none of our forebears were here), and a tradition of freedom, social mobility, youthful optimism, home ownership, a large active bourgeoisie, pluralism under a unifying ethos, the English language, and respect for Western culture, constitutional government, the rights of individuals, and fair play.

"(One should not forget that America was forged in John Harvard's room at Cambridge University in East Anglia in 1628 when the Puritans signed the pact to came to these shores.)"

"Last November, Californians voted to end race and gender-based quotas in state employment and college admissions. Now, diehard multiculturalists are back with color-coded reading lists. They are the enemies of education and equality.

"In San Francisco, a proposal, scheduled to be voted on at a March 24 school-board meeting, would require at least 40 percent of the literature assigned to high-school students be books by authors of color.

"Of 10 assigned books, three would be recognized great works, three would be selected by the teacher and four would have to be by nonwhite writers.

"If the teacher also was race-obsessed, seven of 10 could come from the Lani Guinier classics of world literature.

"Noting that whites comprise only 12 percent of San Fransisco students, proponents declare that the time has come to make literature relevant to non-Caucasian minds.

"Affirmative action in reading? Intriguing notion. But there could be complications. Does Cervantes, who was white but wrote the first great European novel in Spanish, make the cut? Would Jane Austen's gender offset her race?

"If Alberto Fujimori the president of Peru, wrote a novel, would it qualify as Hispanic literature? Why is a novel about white characters by a black preferable to book with black characters by a white (say, *To Kill A Mockingbird* or *Huckleberry Finn*)?

"Steve Phillips, the school-board member who coauthored the mandate explains: 'We recognize that public education has been failing African-American and Latino students. Part of the reason is that the curriculum is not engaging them. Students get more interested in reading and language when they see themselves in the curriculum.'

"A variant of this theme is the role-model hypothesis--that unless black children grow up reading books by black authors or about black scientists and statesmen, they won't realize that blacks can write books, be scientists and statesmen, and generally aspire to excellence.

"Then how to explain the following? In the

Over the past few days many Americans have been shocked by the murder of four young girls and a 32-year-old teacher in Jonesboro, Arkansas.

Questions are being asked as to why something so horrible could happen, and so far, two answers have been forthcoming by the news media-(1) guns and (2) southern culture.

Permit me to suggest that the answers lie elsewhere.

Sociologist Robert Nisbet wrote a few years ago: "The ideologies which gained entry into the academy in the sixties claimed that the fundamental intellectual principles of Western culture were illegitimate and must be overthrown. With that destroyed terms like truth, good, evil, and soul could be discarded."

Present government education is already in the process of destroying terms like truth, good, evil, and soul. Parents are laughed at by educators for even suggesting that education reinforce the moral values of parents.

"The importance of Johnson's book does not lie in its account of historical details or even in his original interpretations. What Johnson has done is to recapture the idea of progress and the theme that progress is measured in terms of the growth of liberty and accountable government. THE SIXTIES RADICALS TODAY

In fact, parents aren't even allowed to look at the questions that students are required to answer in some of our psychobabble questionnaires. Parents in Texas are suing for the right to see these questions.

When our young boys and girls are taught that there is no soul or spirit but only evolving matter, when they are taught that they themselves determine what is right and what is wrong, what can we expect? These two young boys in Arkansas decided for themselves what was right and proceeded to practice their beliefs. Since the educational elite tell us there are no moral absolutes, who among us can say that what they did was wrong? Are we going to say now that "kids killing kids is always wrong" is a moral absolute? That would be a start toward educational sanity.

For anyone seriously wondering about the real reasons why we are facing these situations, the answers will be found in C.S. Lewis' *The Abolition of Man*, Cal Thomas' *The Things That Matter Most*, and Thomas Sowell's *Inside American Education*.

For those who can't or won't read, let me summarize it with C.S. Lewis' famous quote, "We laugh at honor [truth, good, evil, soul, beauty, God] and are shocked to find traitors in our midst."

Among the women showcased are actresses Meryl Streep, Jessica Lange, Glenn Close and Jodie Foster (who recently announced her unmarried pregnancy), Maya Angelou, Grace Slick and R-rated author Erica Jong who apparently believes true equality for women means being able to talk as dirty as the proverbial sailor. Also included are the grandchildren of Planned Parenthood founder Margaret Sanger, whose advocacy of birth control and abortion is praised, but whose racist views and endorsement of eugenics to produce a 'master race' is conveniently ignored.

"A stylish new edition of *The Communist Manifesto* aims to make Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels the latest in radical chic.

"The slender volume is being republished as a glossy, \$13 hardcover for release in New York and London on May Day. The fashionable department store Barneys is thinking about it for a window display.

"The publisher says the 1848 work speaks to a sense on Wall Street that the party can't go on forever. 'There's a sense of anxiety tied to the "The 23-page pamphlet was 'the most influential single piece of political writing since the French Revolution,' historian Efic Hobsbawm, the intellectual guru of Britain's socialists, writes in the introduction to the new, 96-page edition.

"The Communist Party U.S.A., which is based in New York and claims 25,000 members, could use a little marketing.

"'Cool,' spokeswoman Terrie Albano says. 'It wasn't too long ago when everyone was saying communism was dead. Here it is, resurrected.'"

People don't believe things will just carry on, with markets rising forever,' says Colin Robinson, head of Verso publishers, which is printing 20,000 copies on the 150th anniversary of the manifesto. 'Marx's description of a capitalist system prone to shocks and convulsions captures that mood.'

"The revolutionary book, now with a rippling red-flag cover, has become fodder for capitalist fantasy. With a handle attached, the book could make a snazzy accessory to a designer dress, says Simon Doonan, creative director of Barneys on Madison Avenue. One could sashay toward the new millennium, the 19th-century words of Marx and Engels dangling at one's side.

"Doonan is toying with the idea of featuring the *Manifesto*--along with red lipsticks--in the window as 'conceptual art.'

"His assistants are looking for the right lipstick--preferably with a Russian-sounding name.

"With communism gasping around the world, 'it's OK to look at the book as camp,' he says.

"Around Wall Street, the very capital of capitalism, the Borders bookstore at the World Trade Center plans to give the book center display in the front of the store. Barnes & Noble will likewise market the *Manifesto* at its 483 superstores as 'a store front feature.'

"Enough time has passed since the fall of the Iron Curtain so Marxism can again be seen as a utopian philosophy,' says John Kulka, a Barnes & Noble merchandise manager.

"The new edition was designed by two trendy, Soviet-born, New York artists known as Komar and Melamid. With crimson end pages and a ribbon marker of the same color, 'it's elegant enough to grace a coffee table' Robinson says.

"That's not quite what its authors had in mind.

"Written during the Industrial Revolution, the *Manifesto* called the working class to arms against the bourgeoisie.

The *Manifesto* opens with the famous words, 'A spectre is haunting Europe--the spectre of Communism.' It predicts that a catastrophic cycle of booms and busts would befall the new free-market system.

"The war on marriage that the fiminists in academia are waging hit me when I received the winter issue of my alma mater's alumnae magazine, the *Radcliffe Quarterly*. In 52 pages under the heading 'Scenes From the Family' the editors didn't include any discussion of a successful family based on a man and a woman honoring their solemn promises 'to have and to hold ... for better, for worse ... till death do us part.'

"Instead, the feature article laid down the feminist line that a women's identity disappears in marriage and that 'marriage is bad for you, at least if you're female.' Without any shame, the author admitted that she acquired her husband by breaking up another marriage that had lastd 15 years, and produced three children.

"She argued that, instead of getting married for life, men and women (in whatever combination suits their sexual orientation) should sign up for 'a seven-year hitch.' If they want to 'reenlist' for another seven, they may, but after that, the marriage is 'over.'

"Another article described a 'marriage' of lesbians in San Francisco. Still another extolled the wonderful life of a child born out of wedlock, and yet another explained divorce as 'a significant life event that confronts individuals with the opportunity to change.'

"The New York-based Institute for American Values recently completed a study of 20 post-1994 college social science textbooks used in 8,000 college courses. Called 'Closed Hearts, Closed Minds,' the report concluded that most of these textbooks give a pessimistic if not downright hostile view of marriage, emphasizing marital failures rather than its joys and benefits. "Almighty God, our Heavenly Father, Creator of all that is and Preserver of all that Thy hand has made, we pause a moment to acknowledge Thy presence, to call upon Thy name, and to ask for the help and the blessing without which we shall not be able to govern Your people, or succeed with a degree of success in the business which is the responsibility of these honorable men and women chosen by the people to serve them at this time.

"O Lord, we know that You have a controversy with the people of this nation, because as You say in Your Word (Hosea 4:1-6),

...there is no truth, nor mercy, nor knowledge of God in the land. By swearing, and lying, and killing, and stealing, and committing adultery, they break out, and blood toucheth blood. "College textbooks view marriage as especially bleak and dreary for women. The textbooks are inordinately preoccupied with domestic violence and divorce, and view marriage as archaic and oppressive, not just occasionally, but inherently.
