Dead End of Naturalism

"The Christian and the Materialist hold different beliefs about the universe. They can't both be right. The one who is wrong will act in a way which simply doesn't fit the real universe. Consequently, with the best will in the world, he will be helping his fellow creatures to their destruction."

A perfect example of C.S. Lewis' observation that the one who is wrong will act in a way which simply doesn't fit the universe is Michel Foucault. Maoist Foucault (a member of the Proletarian Left, a self-proclaimed Maoist revolutionary cell) lived his life as follows: "When Foucault learned that he had contracted AIDS as the result of his pursuit of sexual transgression, that too became in his mind just another limit-experience: sex as a form of death, as well as the power to give death to others through sex. For at least two years after he

he wrote, the more it seems pointless. But now the very science that 'killed' God is, in the eyes of believers, restoring faith. Physicists have stumbled on signs that the cosmos is custommade for life and consciousness. It turns out that if the constants of nature—unchanging numbers like the strength of gravity, the charge of an electron and the mass of a proton-were the tiniest bit different, then atoms would not hold together, stars would not burn and life would never have made an appearance. 'When you realize that the laws of nature must be incredibly finely tuned to produce the universe we see,' says John Polkinghorne, who had a distinguished career as a physicist at Cambridge University before becoming an Anglican priest in 1982, 'that conspires to plant the idea that the universe did not just happen, but that there must be a purpose behind it."

Honoring C.S. Lewis

"The measure of a great writer is not how many weeks his books spend on the bestseller lists, but how many years his books remain in print after his death. Keith Clack, a manager of Blackwell's bookstore, tells me that C.S. Lewis is one of the few writers whose entire literary output remains in print so many years following his death.

"More than 1,000 people are gathered in Oxford and Cambridge for two weeks to celebrate the life and legacy of C.S. Lewis on the 100th anniversary of his birth and the 35th anniversary of his death.

"Lewis was not a writer only for his time but for all time. He refused to be a part of what we would call 'culture,' speaking instead to themes and ideas that transcend all times and cultures.

"The best the British government could do to commemorate this occasion was issue a stamp. It seems embarrassed to honor Lewis in a way befitting his stature, perhaps for reasons similar to those that denied him a professorial chair at Oxford: fame (which was not sought) coupled with his persuasive arguments about the existence of God. In debates beginning in 1942 at the world-renowned Oxford Union, Lewis took on all comers, including atheists, and won. Five years later he was on the cover of *Time* magazine, which dutifully recognized his genius in literature and apologetics.

"Seeking to separate his readers from their fixation on the now, Lewis wrote: 'Nations, cultures, arts, civilization—these are mortal, and their life is to ours as the life of a gnat.'

"The proof is that fads and fancies of Lewis' time have faded and so will ours. But Lewis' ideas are for all time. The advice of those attending this celebration of a great life well lived would be to turn off the television, start reading C.S. Lewis and be transformed by the renewal of your mind."

"Thomas Howard, chairman of the English Department at St. John's Seminary College in Boston, described Lewis' legacy as 'muscular.' In an age of easy believism (and easy nonbelievism), cheap grace and oversimplification of faith, Lewis has a muscular intellect that forces a reader to focus on ultimate truths. Mr. Howard also noted Lewis' 'modesty, ebullience and deep sincerity,' a man who 'had a vision of heaven and hell' and who had 'no time for humbug.'

"But no one speaks for Lewis better than Lewis himself. About our preoccupation with materialism, Lewis said in *The Screwtape* Letters: 'Prosperity knits a man to the world. He feels that he is "finding his place in it," while really it is finding its place in him.' To those attempting to 'revive' a nation through politics, Lewis' demon instructs his young charge on how to corrupt his assignment: 'Let him begin by treating the Patriotism as a part of his religion. Then let him, under the influence of partisan spirit, come to regard it as the most important part. Then quietly and gradually nurse him on to the stage at which the religion becomes merely part of the "cause," in which Christianity is valued chiefly because of the excellent arguments it can produce. . . . Once you have made the World an end, and faith a means, you have almost won your man, and it makes very little difference what kind of

Here we go again! Just when you thought it could not get any worse—it gets worse.

Our young people hardly have a chance to grow up with any kind of normal value structure intact—much less a Christian value structure.

Cal Thomas says, "Girls are being herded at earlier ages into attitudes and practices far from the 'sugar and spice and everything nice' we used to think or at least wished, that little girls were made of."

In fact, Cal Thomas' exposé of what our young teens are up against is related in the following article on the Spice Girls, which appeared in *The Washington Times* on June 28, 1998. You will quickly sense that our young are confronted on every side with "things" that destroy their souls—and bodies.

"People looking for causes of the cultural decline-including why girls are engaging in sexual activity at ever-younger ages-might wish to consider the Spice Girls.

"At a recent Washington-area appearance of the four (formerly five) women, a near-capacity crowd—including mostly female children, some as young as 4—dressed up in leopard-print miniskirts, platform shoes, midriff-baring tops and hairdos that emulated the performers onstage.

"The stage names, even the real names, of

A reporter says Miss Pillow's outfit might be cute if she were 10, but on the 20-year-old, 'one can't help think centerfold, centerfold, do you have a coat?' Someone should have arrested this woman for contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

"Spice Girls are a long way from 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs' and similar wholesome entertainment available for people of this age group when I was a child. But then our generation mostly stayed together as families, only one parent worked outside the home, drugs were bought at the local pharmacy with a doctor's prescription, and sex was too private to be talked about outside the locker room where more fiction than fact was told.

"Also attending the performance were an assortment of drag queens and other adults adorned in various costumes so that an uninformed observer might take the event for a Halloween party. How did parents explain that? One writer said that 'adults transform the Spice Girls from earnest representatives of young girls' need to feel powerful, appreciated and cool into high camp.' I don't know about the powerful and cool parts, but children used to count on appreciation coming from their parents. Apparently this is another privilege that has been ceded to culture and day-care workers because two-income households no longer have the time and lack the moral

the Spice Girls are less important than the messages they send to the mostly prepubescent audience. Even more disturbing is what is going on in the minds of parents and other relatives who take them to the concerts.

"One of this minimally talented group's popular songs is called 'Naked.' The women sit behind four chairs and perform in a way that suggests they are wearing no clothing. Do parents think this is cute? Other songs, such as 'Do It' and '2 Become 1,' have sexual overtones. Still others, such as 'Sisters Are Doing It for Themselves,' have feminist connotations.

"A story in *The Washington Post* on the group's appearance mentions 20-year-old Lisa Pillow, who apparently suffers from acute maturation disorder. She calls herself 'Kitty Spice' and is dressed in babyblue fur panties and matching cropped top, white fishnet pantyhose and a white marabou boa. She has brought her 5-year-old niece, who is similarly dressed, to the affair.

authority to properly train their children.

"We increasingly teach young girls to adopt the culture's image of what they should be, judging themselves by their level of coolness, attractiveness and ability to sexually manipulate boys. q "Tsholotsho, Zimbabwe–They loaded McDonald Mafu into the donkey cart about 10 minutes after the doctor signed his papers.

- "The quotation marks in the title ["Social Justice"] are used advisedly. The words themselves are among the most successful deceptions ever conceived. Ask a variety of people to define what 'social justice' means, specifically, and you will get as many answers as people queried. Ask the same person at different times and you will get different responses. All 'definitions' of social justice boil down to any of the following:
- "(1) somebody should have the power to determine what you can have, or
- "(2) somebody should have the power to determine what you cannot have, or
- "(3) somebody should have the power to determine what to take away from you in order to give it to others who receive it without any obligation to earn it.

"If millions upon millions have been deluded into searching for 'social justice,' it is because 'social justice' displays the irresistible charm of the temptress and the armament of the enraged avenger; because it adorns itself in intoxication clichés and wears the insignia of the highest institutions of learning. make up a very small percentage of the millions of Americans who call themselves environmentalists. In fact, as noted in the last chapter, it is likely they make up less than about 5 percent of all of us who identify ourselves as environmentalists. But these leaders occupy positions of incredible power. With the exception of a few radical organizations at the state level, most members of the environmental leadership found in national organizations at the national level are high rollers and appear to be involved in the new nature religion.

environment because of what they have heard, read, or seen coming from the national headquarters of environmental organizations. As we have seen, most of this information is so distorted that none of it can be trusted to provide solid information upon which to form opinions about the severity or even the existence of a problem. Tragically, the vast majority of Americans who contribute \$20 to \$30 per year to one or more national organizations don't know what these leaders are *really* doing.

"Americans have a strong sense of justice and fair play, which is often the reason they give dues to these organizations. The majority of supporters would be enraged by the duplicity of the leadership within these groups if they knew so much human suffering was resulting from the relentless drive to implement, by law, their biocentric and religious ideology.

"We do have environmental problems. But most of these, if not all of them, are manageable problems with rational solutions that are far more effective and far less costly than those proposed by the environmental leadership. In this regard, many state level environmental groups, even some national organizations, do not appear to be involved in this nature-based religion that leads to biocentric nihilism. They want to find collaborative solutions as much as any American. They will disagree with those in industry and other segments in the business world over how to resolve problems. But this can be healthy and necessary, if both parties approach the table with a willingness to collaborate. Most state environmental leadership appears to generally accept the premise that we must use natural resources to meet the needs of American people. Although there is evidence this may be changing for the worse, the majority of state leaders are still willing to seek collaborative solutions to find

that balance between using resources and protecting the environment.

"This is not the case for leadership in the national organizations. The myth that national environmental leadership has the best interests of Americans at heart and is beyond reproach in its honesty ethics is simply untrue. Yet it continues unchallenged."

In fact, many climate specialists now agree that actual observations from weather satellites show no global warming whatsoever—in direct contradiction to computer model results.'"

"Early this year, Arthur B. Robinson, director of the Oregon Institute of Science and Medicine, in cooperation with Frederick Seitz, one of America's premier scientists and past president of the National Academy of Sciences and of Rockefeller University, began circulating a 'Global Warming Petition' that flatly denies the crisis scenario and firmly opposes the Kyoto climate accord.

"Accompanying the petition was an extensive, heavily documented paper reviewing the main scientific literature on greenhouse theory. 'The empirical evidence [of] actual measurements of Earth's temperature shows no man-made warming trend,' the paper reported. 'Indeed, over the past two decades, when CO₂ levels have been at their highest, global average temperatures have actually cooled slightly.'

"Initially, the petition went by mail to a variety of scientists. Those who signed and returned cards could ask for more cards to give to colleagues. Then it was put on the Internet so that scientists who wanted to add their signatures could download the petition and signature card, print it out, sign it, and return it. The response has been overwhelming.

"By mid-April more than 15,000 American scientists had signed. By mid-July, the total number of signers had grown to over 18,800. Of these, 16,400 are basic and applied scientists, and nearly all of them have technical training suitable for evaluation of the relevant

feared melting of polar icecaps and consequent rise in sea levels. Furthermore, what warming did occur in the temperate latitudes would be mostly in the winter and at night, thus not increasing the number of days of severe summer heat but instead lengthening growing seasons and narrowing the day/night temperature differential, both of which would benefit agricultural production.

"Another reason the popular fear is wrong is that increased atmospheric carbon dioxide is directly beneficial to plant growth and consequently not only to human beings but also to all animals, who depend on plants for food.

"'As atmospheric CO₂ increases,' the paper points out, 'plant growth rates increase. Also, leaves lose less water as CO₂ increases, so that plants are able to grow under drier conditions. Animal life, which depends upon plant life for food, increases proportionally.'
