□ "This point was made repeatedly by Sir Peter Medawar, an Oxford immunologist who won the Nobel Prize for medicine for the discovery of acquired immunological tolerance. In a significant publication entitled <i>The Limits of Science</i> , Medawar explored the question of how science was limited by the nature of reality. Emphasizing that 'science is incomparably the most successful enterprise human beings have ever engaged upon,' he distinguishes between what he calls 'transcendent' questions, which are better left to religion and metaphysics, and questions about the organization and structure of the material universe." —Alister McGrath, Joanna McGrath, Ibid., p.17
"Though a self-confessed rationalist, Medawar is clear on this matter: 'That there is indeed a limit upon science is made very likely by the existence of questions that science cannot answer, and that no conceivable advance of science would empower it to answerI have in mind such questions as:

□ "Science has, in Dawkins' view, wrecked faith in God, relegating God to the margins of culture, where he is embraced by deluded fanatics. There's an obvious problem, of course—namely, that rather a lot of scientists do believe in God. *The God Delusion* was published in 2006. In that same year, three other books were published by leading research scientists. Owen Gingerich,

a noted Harvard astronomer, produced *God's Universe*, declaring that 'the universe has been created with intention and purpose, and that this belief does not interfere with the scientific enterprise.' Francis Collins published his *Language of God*, which argued that the wonder and ordering of nature pointed to a creator God, very much along the lines of the traditional Christian conception. In this book, Collins describes his own conversion from atheism to Christian faith. This hardly fits Dawkins' rigid insistence that real scientists are atheists.

"A few months later, the cosmologist Paul Davies published his *Goldilocks Enigma*, arguing for the existence of 'fine-tuning' in the universe. For Davies, the bio-friendliness of the universe points to an overarching principle that somehow pushes the universe towards the development of life and mind. The idea that there is any evidence of purpose or design in the universe is, of course, dismissed out of hand by Dawkins. Davies has other ideas. While not subscribing to a traditional Christian notion of God, there's something divine out there. Or maybe in there."

□ "Oxford philosopher Richard Swinburne is one of many writers to argue that the capacity of science to explain itself requires explanation—and that the most economical and reliable account of this explanatory capacity lies in the notion of a creator God.

"Swinburne's argument asserts that the intelligibility of the universe itself needs explanation. It is therefore not the *gaps* in our understanding of the world which point to God, but rather the very *comprehensibility* of scientific and other forms of understanding that requires an explanation. In brief, the argument is that *explicability itself requires explanation*. The more scientific advance is achieved, the greater will be our understanding of the universe—and hence the greater our need to explain this very success. It is an approach which commends and encourages scientific investigation, not seeks to inhibit it."

By the time you read this, we will be well into our two-week sessions for 2007. We ask for your prayers for our students, our staff, and our faculty. This will be my 45th year with Summit Ministries, and it has been a tremendously satisfying journey. While Owen Gingerich insists that the universe is God's universe, his capitulation to Darwin's Theory of evolution is total. Not only total, but highly dishonest. Gingerich quotes Darwin's famous statement, "There is a grandeur in the [evolutionary] view of life, with its several powers," etc., but fails to quote Darwin's statements just a few sentences before which mention "Struggle for Life," the "Extinction of less-improved forms," and "the war of nature." These sentiments make up the essence of natural selection and were the sentiments that drove Hitler, Stalin, and Mussolini to send millions to their graves. Gingerich avoids acknowledging the relationships between Darwin, eugenics, and Hitler. Gingerich likewise avoids using the full title of Darwin's work: *The Origin*

of Species by Means of Natural Selection or The Preservation of Favored Races in the Struggle for Life.

"It may be safe to say that everyone today has learned to live with the established public debt amount of \$8.6 trillion.

"This number comes from adding up the current deficits piling up year after year from the current budget line items...

"...\$650 billion to Health and Human Services...\$550 billion to the Defense Department...\$385 billion to pay the interest on the public's debt...almost \$100 billion to the Department of Agriculture...and on and on and on it goes.

"It's obviously out of control.

"But it's also shockingly understated.

"See, to fund our bloated government, Washington collects taxes and then borrows \$450 billion every year to make up the difference. That means on top of our tax dollars that our government

burns through, it also puts another \$1.2 million on the national credit card...every single day.

"That's the damage just if you accept the current numbers, issued by the bureaucrats doing all that spending. But the real numbers are much worse than Washington is willing to reveal. How much worse?

"Try \$76.62 trillion.

"I know, \$8.6 trillion is already a tough number to wrap your head around. Are there even that many grains of sand on every beach in America? I don't know. But if you started tossing a dollar per second on a bonfire right now, you wouldn't hit \$8.6 trillion for another 272,523 years.

"How about \$76.62 trillion? It would take you 2.42 million years. Yet Washington managed to pull it off in less than 150 years, roughly how long it's been since our government first dipped into the red. It hasn't looked back since."

☐ "The non-partisan Tax Foundation has just released its annual report that reveals how many days Americans must work to pay their federal, state and local taxes for the year. The day when Americans will have finally earned enough to pay all their taxes is called 'Tax Freedom Day.'

"Tax Freedom Day 2007 will arrive on April 30, the 120th day of the year—two days after it occurred in 2006, four days later than 2005 and 11 days later than 2004.

"According to the Tax Foundation, 'Tax Freedom Day has arrived later each year for four years running.' The Bush Administration's biggest tax cuts were enacted in 2003, and that year Tax Freedom Day arrived April 18. Since then, no major federal tax relief has been passed, but the nation's economy has been growing rapidly. The tax burden has risen largely because successful taxpayers have been pushed into higher income tax brackets.

"Tax Freedom Day is calculated by dividing the nation's total tax payments by the nation's income. That yields the total effective rate, which for 2007 is 32.7%. On April 30, 32.7% of the year will have been consumed, meaning that politicians will seize the equivalent of every penny every American earns up to that day just to pay for government.

"Each state has a different total tax burden, so each state has a different Tax Freedom Day. We will work longer to pay taxes this year (120 days) than to buy food, clothing and housing combined (105 days). In fact, we will work longer to pay federal taxes (79 days) than we will to pay housing (62 days.)"

☐ "Police investigating the Virginia Tech killings are looking at whether Cho Seung-Hui was copying parts of a violent film when he murdered 32 people.

"Officers believe he repeatedly watched Oldboy as part of his preparation for the killing spree.

"The film, which won the Grand Prix award at the 2004 Cannes film festival, has been described as 'an ultra-violent movie of obsession and revenge.'

"It contains stylized scenes of killings and an attempted sui-

cide, and is filled with what one critic called 'punishing emotional violence.'

"Similar themes seem to have occurred in Cho's own writings.

"The video, which Cho posted to an American TV network while carrying out his murderous rampage, appears to include photographs of Cho re-enacting scenes from the film.

"He is shown holding a gun to his head and wielding a hammer, images that appear in the movie.

"The fact that he seems to have been influenced by the film will reignite the debate over whether violence in movies and video games can lead to people becoming more violent themselves.

"Cho's video diary, along with his collection of movies, writings and the fact that he bought a gun last month reveal that, rather than the killing spree being a spontaneous event, he had planned the massacre in advance."

☐ "In British schools, young children are learning that the prince doesn't always fall in love with a princess, and not every family includes a Mama Bear and Papa Bear.

"A new pilot project is using picture books, the arts, drama and other techniques to introduce homosexual themes to schoolchildren ages 4 to 11.

"In one picture book, 'King & King,' a prince fails to fall in love with three different princesses before finally falling in love with a man.

"In another, 'And Tango Makes Three,' a zookeeper realizes that two male penguins are in love. He gives them an egg; the hatchling, Tango, grows up with two fathers.

"The project, called No Outsiders, is needed to combat the 'absolutely massive' problem of bias against homosexuals among British schoolchildren, said Elizabeth Atkinson, the director.

"There are more homophobic incidents in our schools than racist incidents,' she said.

"This bias ranges, she said, from the casual and common use of the word 'gay' as an insult to serious bullying of children with two parents of the same sex. Such bullying can do children serious harm, she said, prompting them to withdraw and causing their academic performance to decline.

"But the project has had the effect of uniting conservative Christians and Muslims in opposition.

"'Islam doesn't approve of that sort of behavior,' said Tahir Alam, the education spokesman for the Muslim Council of Britain. 'It's morally unacceptable.'

"Simon Calvert, a spokesman for the Christian Institute, did not return phone calls seeking comment. But he told the *Sunday Observer* newspaper that the No Outsiders project amounted to 'the active promotion of homosexuality in schools.'

"'Let's arrange a series of meetings around the country where parents of primary school children can look at these books,' he said. 'The majority would be aghast.'"

☐ "Everywhere one looks in Europe there are signs that free people are prepared to surrender without a fight to those who would place them in bondage.

"In England, a new government-backed study has found that British schools are dropping the Holocaust from history lessons. Teachers are afraid to teach about the Nazi atrocity because Muslim students might take offense.

"The study also discovered resistance by teachers to cover the 11th-century Crusades, when Christians fought Muslims for control of Jerusalem, because the lessons contradict what Muslim students are taught in mosques. The sacrifice of truth in favor of propaganda for fear of violence is the first step on the road to enslavement.

"It gets worse. A new survey by the respected YouGov organization has found most Britons want to scale down their country's involvement in world affairs at a time of great international challenge. Fifty-five percent of respondents said they oppose Britain 'punching above its weight,' trying to have more influence in the world than its military and economic strength would seem able to support.

"In Belgium, a newspaper has published a copy of the Quran in French and offered free coupons for a Flemish language translation of Islam's holy book. The paper also published a book called *Islam Now*, which presents a history of the religion up to the modern era. I haven't seen it, but would be willing to bet it contains little, if anything, about the terrorism carried out in the name of Islam by fanatics.

"All of this—with surely more on the way—comes from the flawed Western point of view that others will be nice to us if we are nice to them. Were this true, the prisons would be empty and there would be no need for burglar alarms and firearms to protect us from criminals. Evil exists and must be defeated, or evil will triumph.

"The world is on fire, but Britain and much of the rest of Europe are not paying attention. Its enemies are noticing. And while Europe's enemies arm themselves for war, they regard the European attitude toward them as unilateral surrender. Winston Churchill would have called it the gathering storm. As it has done before with severe consequences, modern Europe prefers to ignore the clouds."

"The Discovery Channel is hyping to the heavens its new documentary on 'The Lost Tomb of Jesus.' James Cameron, the Oscar-winning director of 'Titanic,' has joined filmmaker Simcha Jacobovici in publicizing claims that a 2,000-year-old tomb containing 10 boxes of bones belonged to the family of Jesus of Nazareth. It also echoes the dopey 'DaVinci Code' novel by asserting Jesus was married to Mary Magdalene, that the couple had a son. They claim the son was named Judah and that all three were buried together.

"So much for the Resurrection. So much for the Bible. So much for the divinity of Christ. So much for Christianity. It's all a fraud – if one is to believe the nonfiction of the Discovery Channel.

"Other than a syrupy boost—an embarrassingly syrupy boost—from an 'exclusive' appearance on NBC's 'Today' show, the national media for once aren't buying into this cheap publicity stunt and have found a load of skeptics to denounce the film,

maybe because the list of experts, both scientific and religious, is endless.

"Perhaps the most important debunker is professor Amos Kloner, who oversaw the original archaeological dig of this tomb in 1980. 'It makes a great story for a TV film,' Mr. Kloner told the *Jerusalem Post*. 'But it's completely impossible. It's nonsense.'

"Joe Zias, the Rockefeller Museum in Jerusalem's 1972-97 curator for anthropology and archeology who personally numbered the ossuaries at the center of the film, was even harsher: 'Simcha has no creditbility whatsoever. ...He's pimping off the Bible. ...Projects like these make a mockery of the archeological profession.'

"Hebrew University archeologist and epigraphist Leah DiSegni said the names found in the tomb—Mary, Joseph and Jesus—were among the most common of the day. It would be like finding a tomb with the name George on it in the future and asserting it must have been the tomb of President George Bush, Mr. DiSegni told the Cybercast News Service. In addition, biblical scholar Stephen Pfann has questioned even the actual inscription on the tomb, claiming it's 'scratchy' and hard to read. For all we know, it's Johnny, Mabel and Jerry.

"How do the producers defend themselves against the avalanche of criticism? It's so, so typical. On the 'Today' show, Messrs. Jacobovici and Cameron—the 'Titanic' director—finally were pressed to respond to critics like Mr. Zias. They quickly fell back on the laughable concept that they weren't—surprise—experts. Both said they weren't archaeologists. One insisted he was a filmmaker, the other a journalist. Mr. Cameron found it 'compelling' as a layman. In other words, neither has credibility—and neither does the nonfiction Discovery Channel.

"When it comes to ancient Christian sites, the Discovery Channel already had a huge credibility problem on its hands. Discovery aired a 2002 special on the alleged 'Ossuary of James,' declared a forgery in 2003 by the Israel Antiquities Authority. Its promoter, Oded Golan, is on trial for forging part of the inscription. Mr. Jacobovici produced that badly flawed documentary, too.

"The Discovery Channel, like most of the national TV elite, displays a dramatic bias in target selection when it comes to religion. There are no controversies over the historical claims of Islam, Judaism or any other religious faith. But Christianity is another story. It is routinely the subject of sensationalistic TV exposes, complete with breathless claims about how Jesus 'might be' the son of a Roman soldier, or he might have survived the Crucifixion. And now he's a dad, with kids.

"What's worse is that these shoddy alleged exposes always air in the most sacred Christian seasons, like Lent. Last year during Lent, on April 2, 2006 'Dateline NBC' offered part of its show to alleged Jesus-debunker Michael Baigent, even as reporter Sara James declared: 'Baigent acknowledges there's no proof of his theory, but points out that it was possible to survive crucifixion.'

"If the Discovery Channel fails to cancel this slanderous 'documentary,' it will have a to explain why it intentionally misleads the public. This network should be embarrassed by this plunge into sensational speculation masquerading as 'science.' To slander Christianity at the start of the Lenten season is unconscionable. This isn't news. It's sensationalism on a stick. Or in this case, on a cross."

☐ "The financially troubled National Council of Churches (NCC) is selling its biblical roots for money from secular foundations bent on using it to forward a liberal agenda, according to a report by The Institute on Religion and Democracy (IRD).

"John Lomperis and Alan Wisdom, the report's authors, said for decades the NCC was supported by member denominations—but not anymore.

"What was founded as a body comprised of churches seeking to come together in Christian unity," Wisdom said, "has become a political-action committee that's not a creature of the churches anymore."

"The NCC was founded in 1950 and claims more than 50 'faith groups' are members, including the Episcopal Church USA, The United Methodist Church, The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), the United Church of Christ and the Presbyterian Church USA.

"The report 'Strange Yokefellows: The National Council of Churches and Its Growing Non-Church Constituency' details how NCC support from those denominations declined in the last decade.

"'What's happened now,' Wisdom said, 'is that those churches—and particularly the liberal elites in those churches—have become so weakened that they can no longer bear the financial load of the NCC.'

"Then Bob Edgar came on board in 2000 as the NCC's general secretary.

"In 2003, he proclaimed that his salvage work had been successful and that the NCC was on a firm financial footing,' Wisdom said. 'Gradually, we were able to get our hands on some documents that were distributed at NCC meetings that showed how the council was being saved.'

"The *Washington Post* reported that Edgar shook the hands of the report's authors at the announcement.

"'I was brought in to do three things: raise money, raise money, and raise money,' he said. 'Thank you for highlighting that secular as well as religious organizations now recognize the importance of the National Council of Churches.'

"The trail led to millions of dollars in grants from Left-leaning organizations such as the Sierra Club, the Tides Foundation, and the Rockefeller Brothers Fund—organizations bent on promoting abortion, same-sex marriage, and other liberal issues.

"Dr. Janice Crouse, senior fellow at Concerned Women for America's Beverly LaHaye Institute, offered a strong warning.

"'When you cloak all of those cultural concerns and Left-wing agenda items with the cloak of religion and with the mainstream churches, then you are giving them a stamp of approval that they should not have,' she said. 'Most of the religious Left is arguing for positions that are not based in the Scripture.'

"Crouse said while the NCC purports to speak for mainstream American denominations, it obviously does not.

"Their funding comes from far-Left foundations and these foundations are only interested in the political positions of the groups that they sponsor,' she said. 'So it's very clear that, rather than representing Christian causes, they are now representing cultural causes and are far more interested in the kinds of things that happen in the culture and in the secular world than they are within the church.'

"Follow the money' may be an old cliché, she said, but it holds true.

"'When you start following the money,' Crouse said, 'you discover that the foundations that are supporting the National Council of Churches are more interested in a secular agenda than they are in Christian faith.'

☐ "Hurricane forecaster William Gray said Friday that global ocean currents, not human-produced carbon dioxide, are responsible for global warming, and that the Earth may begin to cool on its won in five to 10 years.

"Gray, a Colorado State University researcher best known for his annual forecasts of hurricanes along the U.S. Atlantic coast, also said increasing atmospheric levels of carbon dioxide won't produce more or stronger hurricanes.

"He said that over the past 40 years the number of major hurricanes making landfall on the U.S. Atlantic coast has declined, even though carbon dioxide levels have risen.

"Gray, speaking to a group of Republican state lawmakers, had harsh words for researchers and politicians who say man-made greenhouse gases are responsible for global warming.

"They're blaming it all on humans, which is crazy," he said. "We're not the cause of it."

"Many researchers think warming is causing hurricanes to get stronger; others aren't sure.

"A study published last week suggested warming might make it more difficult for hurricanes to form because it produces more wind vertical wind shear, which can weaken hurricanes.

"But the reseachers, Gabriel A. Vecchi of the National Oceanic and Atmoshperic Administration and Brian J. Soden of the University of Miami, said it was unclear whether the dampening effects of wind shear would cancel out the boost that warmer water gives hurricanes.

"Gray complained that politics and research into global warming have created 'almost an industry' that has unfairly frightened the public and overwhelmed dissenting voices.

"He said research arguing that humans are causing global warning is 'mush' based on unreliable computer models that cannot possibly take into account the hundreds of factors that influence the weather.

"Gray said little-understood ocean currents are behind a decades-long warming cycle and disputed assertions that greenhouse gases could raise global temperatures as much as some scientists predict."
