COMMUNISM

American filmmaker Oliver Stone said Friday he deeply admires [communist] Hugo Chavez but suggested the Venezuelan president might consider talking a bit less on television.

Promoting his new documentary "South of the Border" in Caracas, Stone heaped praise on Chavez, saying he is leading a movement for "social transformation" in Latin America. The film features informal interviews by Stone with Chavez and six allied leftist presidents, from Bolivia's Evo Morales to Cuba's Raul Castro.

"I admire Hugo. I like him very much as a person. I can say one thing.... He shouldn't be on television all the time," Stone said at a news conference. "As a director I say you don't want to be overpowering. And I think he is sometimes that way."

Chavez makes near-daily speeches that run for hours, often reminiscing, lecturing about history, announcing news, and breaking into song. His Sunday program can last six hours or more.

"He's a soldier and he speaks from his heart," Stone said. "His vision is huge.... And he will go down in history."

The Oscar-winning director hopes his documentary will help people better understand a leader who Stone said is wrongly ridiculed "as a strongman, as a buffoon, as a clown."

"This is a positive portrayal of a man who Americans do not have access to," Stone said. "He is demonized in the American and European press as a monster."

Chavez, who joined Stone for the premiere of the film at last year's Venice Film Festival, hosted a screening Friday night at a Caracas theater and called the director a good friend.

from the PRESIDENT'S DESK a word from Dr. Noebel

By the time you read this we will be well into Summit's twoweek summer worldview conferences. In fact, I am writing this the day after we graduated III students from our first session. Believe me when I say graduation is not easy for the simple reason that I hate to say good-bye to students after living with and teaching them for two weeks. Two of this session's students had just returned from Iraq as soldiers in the U.S.Army, and their presence (along with two other militaryoriented students) gave this class a distinct touch of reality.

To say that I love these future leaders of our nation, churches, families, schools, businesses, media, etc., would be an understatement. I also know that you, our Journal readers, wish them the best for their lives in whatever station they find themselves.

This month I would like to emphasize a specific part of our vision for the Summit so there is no mistake about why we exist. I would also like to alert you about an upcoming book that is mentioned elsewhere in this issue.

Our graduates understand our core teaching that there are six "evangelistic" worldviews vying for the attention and allegiance of Western civilization in particular, but also the whole world in general. They are Christianity, Islam, Secular Humanism, Marxism, New Age, and Postmodernism. These six define the collision of worldviews in the West, and as Western Christians we are certainly aware that we are fast approaching a post-Christian era.


Understanding this, however, makes it no easier for Christian young people to cope with the anti-Christian curricula they encounter from kindergarten through graduate school. Our concern is whether they are prepared to live through it or fall under it and lose their faith in the process.

The fact that the President of the United States would hire a flaming homosexual like Kevin Jennings to take a position that involves innocent, naïve public school boys and girls is proof that the "child molestation" mentality goes all the way to the top. It was Jennings who wrote the introduction to the book Queering Elementary Education: Advancing the Dialogue about Sexualities and Schooling. There is no shame in this socialistic, pro-sodomite administration. It's hard to remember that at one time the Democratic Party (my father's party) was anti-socialistic and anti-homosexual! How the times have changed.

Let me reiterate: At the Summit our primary goal is to make sure Christian young people understand their own worldview, are able to defend it lovingly but courageously, and hence are prepared to witness for Christ amongst a deceived generation—one that believes truth is relative, morals are more so, and the universe somehow just happened by chance while their ancestors were conceived out of foamy, blue-green algae pond scum. "They demonize us is North America, in Europe, in a good part of the world. And Oliver dove is, so to speak, seeking the truth," Chavez said. He called the movie "a splinter in the eagle's talon"—a reference to the United States.

Stone said President Barack Obama's administration, in spite of initially inspiring hope, hasn't done anything to improve U.S. relations with Chavez or his Latin American allies.

The director defended his decision not to interview Chavez's opponents, saying that people already hear those complaints and that the movie is not intended as a detailed examination of Chavez's record.

"It's an introduction to an entire movement in South America that the Americans do not know anything about," he said.

Stone is starting a Latin American tour to promote the film, with screenings planned in Ecuador, Brazil, Bolivia, Paraguay, and Argentina. The documentary is being released in some cities in the United States and Europe this summer.

The New American: To what extent has the leftist movement gained power in Latin America? What factors led to this resurgence and how was it possible?

Carvalho: Communist and pro-communist parties rule about a dozen Latin American countries today. This fact, by itself, is enough to prove that the "end of communism," proclaimed by the Right soon after the fall of the Soviet Union, is a myth. World communism was never only an appendix of the USSR. It actually created the USSR, not the other way around. It existed a century before the Russian Revolution and continued to exist after the nominal extinction of Soviet power. What made the resurgence of communism easier—not only in Latin America, but around the world—was the cowardly timidity of Western right-wingers who, instead of taking the opportunity of the fall of the USSR to punish the communists for their crimes, chose instead a policy of "extending them a hand," as if asking for their pardon for having defeated them, and offering them all sorts of aid, enabling them to reappear with a new or attenuated identity, even protecting them from being called "communists" (the fashionable euphemism

is now "populism"). I believe that this absurd surrender of the winners was also stimulated by powerful globalist circles, whose interest in establishing worldwide bureaucratic controls converges with the objectives of the communists. The number of billionaire companies which came to openly contribute to leftist parties is enormous. I call "meta-capitalists" the individuals and groups which grew so wealthy with the market economy that they can't stand anymore being at the mercy of the free market and seek, instead, to control everything, supporting bureaucracy instead of capitalism. Metacapitalists are natural allies of the communists.

An event that clearly symbolizes this union of apparent adversaries was the tributes paid to Lula, the Brazilian President, who in the same week was honored by the World Economic Forum in Davos, for his conversion to capitalism, and by the São Paulo Forum, for his allegiance to communism. The contradiction is only apparent. At the World Social Forum in Porto Alegre, which for public opinion embodies the opposite of the Davos Forum, the main demand was for a greater control over the world economy by big international organizations. Nobody there asked for shutting down the IMF or the World Bank, what they wanted was the integration of "civil society"—i.e., the World Social Forum—into those organizations. Many European NGOs [non-governmental organizations] which participate in the World Social Forum have a seat at the meetings of the World Bank and other international organizations. The "ideological" contrast serves only as propaganda. What we have is a gigantic symbiosis of all globalist and statist forces around the world.

At the Parthenon last week, the Greek Communist Party, which got 8 percent of the vote in the last national election, draped banners emblazoned with the hammer and sickle: "Peoples of Europe Rise Up." Of course. "Arise ye prisoners of starvation" exhorts "The Internationale," the left's ancient anthem. But who is to arise against whom?

Time was, the European left said it spoke for hornyhanded sons of toil oppressed in dark Satanic mills. But Athens' so-called "anti-government mobs" have been composed mostly of government employees going berserk about threats to their entitlements. The government cannot fire many of them because Article 103, Paragraph 4 of the Greek constitution says: "Civil servants holding posts provided by law shall be permanent so long as these posts exist."

America's projected \$9.7 trillion in budget deficits in this decade will drive the nation's debt to 90 percent of GDP (Greece's is 124 percent).

So some people say that to avoid a Greek-style crisis, America should adopt a value-added tax. But Europe's most troubled nations—the PIIGS: Portugal, Ireland, Italy, Greece,

and Spain—have VATs of 20 percent, 21 percent, 20 percent, 21 percent, and 16 percent, respectively.

Germans are furious about being the biggest bailers in this bailout of a nation where tax evasion is pandemic. They have not been assuaged by being told by their chancellor that the stakes are stupendous: Their money will save "Europe." Hearing that, Greeks bearing banners proclaiming "Out with the IMF" might think:

Why accept "austerity" (as that is understood in Greece—no more annual bonuses of two months' salary, no more retirement at 53)? Suppose, after pocketing some of the bailout, we just threaten to collapse and make a mess of "Europe"?

Greece now knows the terrific strength of weakness. Beware of Greeks—or any other people—receiving gifts.

Human Events had the opportunity to interview forecaster extraordinaire Gerald Celente, President of Trends Research Institute, several days ago—and the future he predicts looks bleak indeed. In fact, as Mr. Celente sees it, the Great Depression will seem like a mild recession to what waits for us as 2011 hits with the force of a Katrina financial hurricane.

In case you're wondering who Mr. Celente is (if this is still possible), he's appeared—along with his predictions on Oprah, CNBC, Reuters, NBC, PBS, BBC, the Glenn Beck Show—the list goes on and on. His Trends Report has been successfully predicting the major future trends impacting our lives for 3 decades, including calling the dot com crash back in the 1990s.

Mr. Celente's forecast on our impending future is based on his study of history. He says we are bent on destroying our currency, bankrupting our government, and unleashing a violent citizen-against-citizen eruption as the economy collapses into chaos and martial law fascism.

Quite a claim. And God help us if he is right—again.

"We're sounding the alarm about the ongoing downward economic cycle." Gerald told Human Events. "In 2002, we predicted that the collapse of the American empire would fall like the World Trade Center in a thunderous crash—in slow motion before our eyes. And now it's happening."

Mr. Celente follows over 300 trends: family, crime, war, education, consumer & business patterns which TRI [Trends Research Institute] synthesizes to predict the future.

"The US is becoming a shadow of what it used to be. Take education for example. The OECD group of developed countries ranks quality of life, education, and health care of its member nations. The US is now falling down the table as one piece of data after another shows America is in decline. We're no longer Win, Place, or Show in quality of life, education, longevity...all the essentials where we used to be #1. And our economic underpinnings are failing."

Mr. Celente puts part of the blame squarely on the federal government, and especially FED Chairman Bernanke and Treasury Secretary Geithner, and warns us not to believe a word they say, "They're the same people who didn't see it coming—and now telling us the worst is over, that 'green shoots are spouting upwards.' But they were wrong before. They're wrong on this too."

"When you pump out tons of money manure into this system based on nothing—printing press paper, it's like giving a patient with a chronic disease a pain killer—it won't cure the patient."

'But let's go beyond the economics. Our whole Constitution has been abrogated. The president simply writes an Executive Order to do whatever he wants. Nationalize the banks, take over the insurance industry, automobile industry, health care industry....None of it is constitutional."

One of the many shallow statements that sound good if you don't stop and think about it—is that "at some point, you have made enough money."

The key word in this statement, made by President Barack Obama recently, is "you." There is nothing wrong with my deciding how much money is enough for me or your deciding how much money is enough for you, but when politicians think that they should be deciding how much money is enough for other people, that is starting down a very slippery slope.

Politicians with the power to determine each citizen's income are no longer public servants. They are public masters.

Are we really so eaten up with envy, or so mesmerized by rhetoric, that we are willing to sacrifice our own freedom by giving politicians the power to decide how much money anybody can make or keep? Of course, that will start only with "the rich," but surely it will not end there.

The French Revolution began arbitrary executions among the hereditary aristocracy but ended up arbitrarily executing all sorts of other people, including eventually even leaders of the Revolution itself, such as Robespierre.

Very similar patterns appeared in the Bolshevik Revolution, in the rise of the Nazis, and in numerous other times and places. Once you buy the argument that some segment of the citizenry should lose their rights, just because they are envied or resented, you are putting your own rights in jeopardy—quite aside from undermining any moral basis for respecting anybody's rights. You are opening the floodgates to arbitrary power. And once you open the floodgates, you can't tell the water where to go.

Nothing speaks more highly of Colorado Springs and its conservative fiscal policies than the now-routine attacks by the mostly left-leaning mainstream press.

The latest round began with an inane column by the Denver Post's Susan Greene, who can't stomach driving into the Springs on Ronald Reagan Highway. She is mostly upset because a majority on the City Council refused to sign a letter supporting an expensive federal pork scam that promises jobs for cities. Greene conflated the lack of pork support to the plight of a local man living on the streets. Then she quoted Mayor Lionel Rivera, without the benefit of adequate context, saying: "Some people want a homeless life. Some people, they really do." This moved MSNBC's Keith Olbermann to choose Rivera as runner-up for his "Worst Person in the World" award.

Neither Greene nor Olbermann mentioned the fact Rivera supports using city cash to house the homeless in motel rooms, living at higher standards than a majority of the world's population. Given the lavish treatment of the homeless here, life on the streets is a choice.

"It's a small percentage who choose to be homeless, but what the mayor said is absolutely true," said Robert Holmes, executive director of Homeward Pikes Peak, an umbrella organization for agencies that serve the homeless.

Lorraine Moreland was homeless for eight years, living at the doorway of a liquor store at the hostile corner of Third and Alvarado streets in Los Angeles. A nun took her in, and today she works full time at L.A.'s Good Shepherd Center For Homeless. The Gazette asked her about Rivera's statement.

"That's absolutely true," said Moreland, a black woman who has experienced poverty, despair, and bad breaks. "There are a lot of people who are homeless by choice. It frees them from a job that won't cover the rent and bills and the tax people who take a good chunk of what they earn. Being homeless frees a lot of people from that kind of a life, and a lot of people choose that freedom."

Ted Hayes, a homeless activist in L.A., chose to be homeless 25 years ago and won't have it any other way.

"No, your mayor is not wrong about that," Hayes told The Gazette. "The homeless, those who are most intelligent, refuse to entangle themselves in the madness of middle-class America. The middle-class tax slaves are so overburdened and overtaxed, paying for the rich and the poor, that they wonder what they're working for. That's why we have a tea party. A lot of the homeless realize they are free of all that. After they acclimate to living homeless, they realize that it's a state of tranquility. At that point, there isn't enough you can offer them to return to the middle-class madness."

In Colorado Springs, the free homeless folks live in fullservice motels thanks in large part to Rivera. Yet a liberal TV clown thinks he's horrible. Take it as a compliment, Mayor Rivera.

To understand the pertinence to America of events in Greece, notice General Motors' most recent misbehavior. A television commercial featuring CEO Ed Whitacre demonstrates the constitutional murkiness and intellectual dishonesty that results when the line between public and private sectors disappears.

In the commercial, Whitacre says GM has "repaid our government loan in full." Rep. Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) noted that GM used government funds to pay back the government: It "simply transferred \$6.7 billion from one taxpayer-funded TARP account to another." The government still owns 60.8 percent of GM's common equity, and the Congressional Budget Office projects that the government will lose about \$34 billion of the \$82 billion of TARP funds disbursed to the automotive industry.

When Ryan and two colleagues asked the Treasury Department for clarification, they got this careful reply: "Treasury has never suggested that the loan repayment represented a full return of all government assistance." A Treasury news release did say "GM Repays Treasury Loan in Full." The loan is, however, a small part of taxpayer exposure.

HOMOSEXWALITY

Using "safe schools" as a code phrase for promoting homosexuality to kids is no fly-by-night maneuver. It's a wellplanned strategy crafted in large part by "Safe Schools" czar Kevin Jennings, the founder of GLSEN (Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network).

In GLSEN's early years, Jennings explained his plan: "We immediately seized upon the opponents' calling card—safety—and turned it to our favor by illustrating how homophobia is a threat to students' safety...After all, who can be against 'valuing and respecting' everyone?... Who can oppose 'healthy school climate'?"

In fact, Jennings has a 17-year track record of using the word "safety" to push homosexual activism in schools.

What's scary about this is that the Obama administration has not only made Jennings a powerful "Safe Schools czar," but it has also allocated some \$410 million for programs over-seen by Jennings in its proposed 2011 budget. Jennings has already stated that he wants to use some \$70 million for "school climate projects."

Illinois mom Tammy Schulz recently discovered that when her school district uses the words "safe" and "welcome," she feels neither.

It all started in January when she received an invitation to a "Welcoming Schools" presentation at the local Beye elementary school. Billed as a way to address bullying, the program was introduced by the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance and its executive director, Shannon Sullivan.

"Safe schools" and "welcoming" sounded nice. But when Schulz did a little research on the Internet, she didn't like what she saw. It turned out that the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance had strong ties to GLSEN (Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network)—a national homosexual-activist group dedicated to promoting homosexuality to public school kids all the way down to the kindergarten level.

Not only had the national GLSEN office recently honored the Illinois Safe Schools Alliance as its "partner organization," but a former GLSEN affiliate had helped start the alliance in the first place.

Targeting schools has always been a high priority of homosexual-activist groups. It's not even something they've tried to hide—"we recognize that schools are 'ground zero' in our efforts," proclaims the Web site for PFLAG (Parents, Families and Friends of Lesbians and Gays).

From the beginning, GLSEN—the brainchild of President Obama's controversial "Safe Schools czar" Kevin Jennings has supported schools that take a "whole-school approach, incorporating gay issues into their curricula, their extracurricular activities, their assemblies, their faculty and parent education programs, and other areas from kindergarten through twelfth grade."

After all, gay activists realize that if they can capture the hearts and minds of the next generation, they will, for all practical purposes, have won the culture war. Problem is, they still find their agenda being blocked by a formidable force parents and people of faith who don't want their taxpayerfunded schools transformed into indoctrination centers.

So they have latched onto a more subtle tactic-infiltrating classrooms under the cover of "anti-bullying" or "safe schools" initiatives.

EDUCATION

The Texas State Board of Education adopted a social studies and history curriculum Friday that amends or waters down the teaching of the civil rights movement, slavery, America's relationship with the U.N. and hundreds of other items.

The debate over the guidelines, which drew intense scrutiny beyond TX, stems from the fact that they will be used to teach some 4.8 million Texas students for the next 10 years.

The standards also will be used by textbook publishers who often develop materials for other states based on those approved in Texas, although teachers in the Lone Star state have latitude in deciding which material to teach.

The board took separate votes on standards for high schools and kindergarten through eighth grades. The final vote was 9-5 on each set of standards.

The debate has brought national attention, including testimony from educators, civil rights leaders, and a former U.S. education secretary.

The ideological dispute contributed to the defeat of one of the board's most outspoken conservatives, Chairman Don McLeroy, in the March state Republican primary.

In final edits leading up to the vote, conservatives rejected language to modernize the classification of historic periods to B.C.E. and C.E. from the traditional B.C. and A.D.

They also required that public school students in Texas evaluate efforts by global organizations to undermine U.S. sovereignty.

During the months-long process of creating the guidelines, conservatives successfully strengthened the requirements on teaching the Judeo-Christian influences of the nation's Founding Fathers and attempted to water down rationale for the separation of church and state.

The standards will refer to the U.S. government as a "constitutional republic," rather than "democratic," and students will be required to study the decline in the value of the U.S. dollar, including the abandonment of the gold standard.

Conservatives say the Texas history curriculum has been unfairly skewed to the left after years of Democratic control of the board.

SCIENCE

The Icelandic eruption that has caused misery for air travellers could be part of a surge in volcanic activity that will affect the whole of Europe for decades, scientists have warned.

They have reconstructed a timeline of 205 eruptions in Iceland, spanning the past 1,100 years, and found that they occur in regular cycles—with the relatively quiet phase that dominated the past five decades now coming to an end.

At least three other big Icelandic volcanoes are build-

ing towards an eruption, according to Thor Thordarson, a volcanologist at Edinburgh University.

"The frequency of Icelandic eruptions seems to rise and fall in a cycle lasting around 140 years," he said. "In the latter part of the 20th century we were in a low period, but now there is evidence that we could be approaching a peak."

His findings coincide with new warnings that the eruption of Eyjafjallajokull, which has disrupted air traffic across Europe for several weeks, could carry on for many months—and possibly years.

Some geologists have also warned of a serious threat from a fourth volcano, Katla, which lies 15 miles to the east of Eyjafjallajokull. Two of its past three eruptions seemed to be triggered by those of its smaller neighbour and a report issued just before Eyjafjallajokull blew suggested Katla was "close to failure [eruption]".

The three other volcanoes cited by Thordarson as being potentially close to a large eruption are Grimsvotn, Hekla and Askja—all of which are bigger than Eyjafjallajokull.

In the past, they have proved devastating. Hekla alone has erupted about 20 times since AD 874, pouring out a total of two cubic miles of lava from a line of fissures that stretches 3Å miles across the mountain.

There was a minor eruption in 2000 and geologists have reported that snow is once again melting on Hekla's summit, suggesting that magma is rising.

Grimsvotn, another highly active volcano, lies under the huge Vatnajokull glacier in Iceland's southeast. An eruption in 1996 saw much of this glacial ice melt, causing a flood that washed away the country's main ring road.

It is linked to the massive Laki fissure volcano whose 1783 eruption ejected so much ash into the atmosphere that it cooled the entire northern hemisphere for nearly three years. The resulting low temperatures caused crop failures and famines that killed 2 million people and helped trigger the French Revolution.

With publication of On the Origin of Species in 1859, the hunt was on for the "missing link." Fame and fortune awaited the scientist who found the link proving Darwin right: that man evolved from a monkey.

In 1912, success! In a gravel pit near Piltdown in East Sussex, there was found the cranium of a man with the jaw

of an ape.

"Darwin Theory Proved True," ran the banner headline. Evolution skeptics were pilloried, and three English scientists were knighted for validating Piltdown Man.

It wasn't until 1953, after generations of biology students had been taught about Piltdown Man, that closer inspection discovered that the cranium belonged to a medieval Englishman, the bones had been dyed to look older and the jaw belonged to an orangutan whose teeth had been filed down to look human.

The scientific discovery of the century became the hoax of the century. But Piltdown Man was not alone. There was Nebraska Man. In 1922, Henry Fairfield Osborn, president of the American Museum of Natural History, identified a tooth fossil found in Nebraska to be that of an "anthropoid ape." He used his discovery to mock William Jennings Bryan, newly elected to Congress, as "the most distinguished primate which the State of Nebraska has yet produced."

Invited to testify at the Scopes trial, however, Osborn begged off. For, by 1925, Nebraska Man's tooth had been traced to a wild pig, and Creationist Duane Gish, a biochemist, had remarked of Osborn's Nebraska Man, "I believe this is a case in which a scientist made a man out of a pig, and the pig made a monkey out of the scientist."

These stories are wonderfully told in Eugene Windchy's 2009 The End of Darwinism. But if Piltdown Man and his American cousin Nebraska Man were the hoaxes of the 20th century, global warming is the great hoax of the 21st. In a matter of months, what have we learned:

- In its 2007 report claiming that the Himalayan glaciers are melting, the U.N. Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change relied on a 1999 news story in a popular science journal, based on one interview with a littleknown Indian scientist who said this was pure "speculation," not supported by any research. The IPCC also misreported the supposed date of the glaciers' meltdown as 2035. The Indian had suggested 2350.
- The IPCC report that global warming is going to kill 40 percent of the Amazon rainforest and cut African crop yields 50 percent has been found to be alarmist propaganda.
- The IPCC 2007 report declared 55 percent of Holland to be below sea level, an exaggeration of over 100 percent.
- While endless keening is heard over the Arctic ice cap, we hear almost nothing of the 2009 report of the British Antarctica Survey that the sea ice cap of Antarctica has been expanding by 100,000 square kilometers a decade for 30 years. That translates into 3,800 square miles of new Antarctic ice every year.
- Though America endured one of the worst winters ever, while the 2009 hurricane season was among

- the mildest, the warmers say this proves nothing. But when our winters were mild and the 2005 hurricane season brought four major storms to the U.S. coast, Katrina among them, the warmers said this validated their theory.
- The Climatic Research Unit at East Anglia University, which provides the scientific backup for the IPCC, apparently threw out the basic data on which it based claims of a rise in global temperatures for the century. And a hacker into its e-mail files found CRU "scientists" had squelched the publication of dissenting views.

What we learned in a year's time: Polar bears are not vanishing. Sea levels are not rising at anything like the 20foot surge this century was to bring. Cities are not sinking. Beaches are not disappearing. Temperatures have not been rising since the late 1990s. And, in historic terms, our global warming is not at all unprecedented. How horrible was it?

"The Vikings discovered and settled Greenland around A.D. 950. Greenland was then so warm that thousands of colonists supported themselves by pasturing cattle on what is now frozen tundra. During this great global warming, Europe built the looming castles and soaring cathedrals that even today stun tourists with their size, beauty, and engineering excellence. These colossal buildings required the investment of millions of man-hours—which could be spared from farming because of higher crop yields."

Today's global warming hysteria is the hoax of the 21st century. H.L. Mencken had it right: "The whole aim of practical politics is to keep the populace alarmed—and hence clamorous to be led to safety—by menacing it with an endless series of hobgoblins, all of them imaginary."

"It would be nice-or at least honest," writes Sean Hannity, "if Barack Obama would just come out and admit his socialism."

That sentence appears in the chapter titled "Obama the Socialist" in Hannity's new book, Conservative Victory—Defeating Obama's Radical Agenda. In a recent interview about the book, Hannity told me he believes Obama "meets the dictionary definition" of a socialist.

This is the plain truth. Obama is a Socialist. Merriam-Webster defines socialism as "any of various economic and political theories advocating collective or government ownership and administration of the means of production and distribution of goods." A Socialist is "one who advocates or practices socialism."

Obama, for example, practiced socialism with General Motors.

Last year, he directed the government to take 60 percent ownership of GM. Congress had not enacted legislation authorizing him to do this. He simply took money out of the Troubled Asset Relief Program, which had been appropriated to buy assets from financial institutions (not manufacturers), and bought the federal government an auto company.

Obama's greatest Socialist act so far, however, is the national health care system he signed into law last month.

"As a leftist to his core, Barack Obama has been salivating over socialized medicine for years," writes Hannity. "It's the perfect policy vehicle for Socialists who want to ensure that government's tentacles will spread into all aspects of our society. They have been trying for decades to impose it on this liberty-loving nation. It is the Socialists' dream, a solution that has all the attributes of Trojan-horse liberalism: It appears perfectly compassionate on the drawing board, while operating as a freedom vacuum once put into practice."

This, again, is the plain truth. Under Obamacare, the government will start out subsidizing the health insurance of Americans making up to 400 percent of the poverty level. In return for this redistribution of wealth, those who go on the health care dole will give up a significant measure of freedom.

Obamacare gives government the power to control which health insurance plans they can buy and what benefits those plans will-or will not-provide. In its role as primary paymaster and regulator of the health care system, the government will have decisive leverage over some of the most morally consequential decisions individuals ever make.

And that is before the system evolves into a single-payer system, which it inevitably will, as insurance companies discover they cannot deliver the benefits the government demands at the price the government will pay, and as individuals who make too much to qualify for a government subsidy discover they earn too little to buy the plan the government insists they must.

"What we need is less government and a vigorous reintroduction of market forces into the medical industry," writes Hannity.

Conservative Victory is a gutsy book that pulls no punches in defining the threat that Barack Obama's agenda poses to American freedom. But it also makes a powerful case for the counter-agenda needed to take our country back. That agenda is old-fashioned, unapologetic Ronald Reagan conservatism—a conservatism that stands for free enterprise, traditional morality, and peace through strength.

"Our free-market system is the reason that American prosperity has outshined that of every other free nation in history," writes Hannity. "The time is ripe for conservatives to make their case—not just a rejection of Obama socialism, but a reinvigoration of free-market capitalism."

"Conservatives, being God-fearing at their core, are committed to protect the sanctity of human life," he writes. "We support the concept of traditional marriage, between one man and one woman, as one of the essential institutions of a stable, ordered society."

"It was Ronald Reagan's steadfast insistence on SDI at Reykjavik, against the hysterical hand-wringing of nuclearfreeze liberals, that eventually forced Mikhail Gorbachev to capitulate in the Cold War," he writes. "We won not by surrendering but by protecting our interests and our principles from a position of strength."

"The true key to conservative victory," writes Hannity, "is to stay true to conservative principles; to convey the message clearly and powerfully; and to refuse to let liberals distort what we stand for and what is in our hearts."

Exactly.

Wallace: All right. Now the secular part?

Gingrich: Well, the secular part...look at his appointments, if you look at an equal employment opportunity commission appointee who says basically religious liberty has to be subordinated to identity politics, meaning the gay agenda, you look at a Democratic candidate for the Senate in Massachusetts who says, 'You know, if you're a practicing Catholic maybe you shouldn't work in emergency rooms,' I mean, there's a continuous, relentless anti-religious bias.

The recent judge's decision that a day of prayer is unconstitutional-which if it weren't so serious it would be laughable...as a threat to our way of life, the degree to which the secular-socialist left represents a fundamental replacement of America, a very different world view, a very different outcome, I think is a very serious threat to our way of life.
